NATURE, OBJECTIVES AND STRATEGIES

The members present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 July 2019.

Legal status

The Corporation was established under The Further and Higher Education Act 1992 for the purpose of conducting West Thames College. The College is an exempt charity for the purposes of Part 3 of the Charities Act 2011.

College vision, values and principles

The College's vision, values and principles were agreed after a six-month College-wide consultation process and are subject to regular review to ensure they continue to meet requirements. All College managers are expected to demonstrate these values and principles through their leadership and management with the support of all members of staff. The College's vision, as approved by its members, is as follows:

West Thames will be a vibrant college, inspiring all our learners to fulfil their dreams and ambitions. Our outstanding education and training will contribute to a prosperous and cohesive community.

Underpinning this vision are our four shared values and beliefs of:

- Integrity
- Excellence
- Equality
- Respect

Public Benefit

West Thames College is an exempt charity under the Part 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and following the Machinery of Government changes in July 2016 is regulated by the Secretary of State for Education. The members of the Corporation, who are trustees of the charity, are disclosed on pages 10 and 11.

In setting and reviewing the College's strategic objectives, the Corporation has had due regard for the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and particularly upon its supplementary guidance on the advancement of education. The guidance sets out the requirement that all organisations wishing to be recognised as charities must demonstrate, explicitly, that their aims are for the public benefit.

In delivering its mission, the College provides the following identifiable public benefits through the advancement of education:

- High-quality teaching
- Widening participation and tackling social exclusion
- Excellent employment record for students
- Strong student support systems
- Links with employers, industry and commerce
- Links with Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs)

Implementation of strategic plan

In July 2010 the Corporation agreed three long-term strategic goals which have been reviewed and retained as still current. The strategic goals are:

- To provide an **OUTSTANDING** learning experience for all our learners
- To be **INNOVATIVE** and **RESPONSIVE** to current and future needs
- To provide an **EXCELLENT** environment and resources

Specific annual objectives are agreed by the Corporation and circulated to all staff. The College's specific development objectives for 2018-19 and achievement of those objectives are addressed below:

In Goal 1: To provide an OUTSTANDING learning experience for all our learners

In November 2017, the College was inspected by Ofsted and an overall judgement of 'requires improvement' was given. In response to this, the College set out a very detailed Post Inspection Action Plan (PIAP) and took the appropriate interventions where required in order to drive the quality improvements needed. The progress made

against the areas requiring improvement was rigorously monitored and reviewed, which included regular updates to the Corporation. The PIAP replaced goal 1 of providing an outstanding learning experience. Significant progress was made against the areas identified for improvement with a much sharper focus on the quality of teaching, learning and assessment (TLA). This shows an enhanced end-of-year position with improvements having been secured in all six aspects of TLA. These improvements have contributed to high achievement rates for 16-18s and for adult students.

Of the eleven objectives under goals 2 and 3 of the 2018-19 Development Plan, nine were fully met and two were partially met.

In Goal 2: To be INNOVATIVE and RESPONSIVE to current and future needs of our communities

All of the six objectives from goal 2 were fully or partially met.

- Following the widening of the work experience programme, 91% of students on level 2 and 3 programmes of study took part in purposeful work-related learning.
- Information regarding students' next steps in education, training and/or employment was gathered, monitored and tracked effectively to inform curriculum planning
- The role of students in securing in-year improvements in teaching, learning and assessment was strengthened with students involved in all phases of the lesson observation scheme.
- Partnership working with co-located partners was further developed through closer working on curriculum development and another long-term lease agreement which will deliver higher and more diverse income. The College will continue to explore new opportunities to grow and diversify income next year
- The College will continue work to strengthen the planning and delivery of marketing, recruitment and interview activities to meet enrolment targets and fulfil funding allocations.

In Goal 3: To provide an EXCELLENT environment and resources

All of the five objectives were fully met.

- A revised, tailored CPD programme and training linked to quality improvement was implemented as part of ensuring the College provides a highly-skilled workforce to meet the current and future demands of the curriculum.
- The College developed the bespoke programme of leadership and management training with a second module undertaken by the College Management Team in 2018-19 that followed the initial module from 2017-18. The final training module in this series will be delivered in Spring 2020.
- In line with good practice in the sector, curriculum area accounting and contribution analysis was developed and used to help inform curriculum design and offer for 2019-20.
- Processes and systems were developed to enable a more effective and efficient information exchange with Governors and stakeholders. This included continued development of a Governors' portal and new data dashboard to report and monitor progress against agreed KPIs.
- Utilisation of the College's estate was improved through development of opportunities to maximise use of facilities throughout the calendar year. A space utilisation survey was undertaken in November 2018 to identify areas for improvement. This helped to inform the co-location from August 2019 of a new partner – The Rise School Sixth Form – at our Isleworth campus.

Financial objectives

The College's continuing financial objectives are to manage and allocate resources so as to achieve its aims:

- Maintain the sound finances required to deliver our services.
- Meet or exceed budgeted revenue income and operate within budgeted expenditure each year.
- Increase non-funding agency income through target-setting.
- Manage cash resources to meet planned improvements in buildings and facilities.
- Continue to raise the awareness of College staff of the financial constraints and competitive environment within which it must operate.

A series of performance indicators has been agreed to monitor the successful implementation of the policies.

*Actual delivery of Adult Education Budget provision in 2018-19 is valued at £3,365k, which exceeds the allocation by £130k (4%). In 2018-19, the ESFA committed to fund over-delivery by up to 3% of allocations. Retrospectively, they also confirmed funding of over-delivery in 2017-18 up to the same limit. The income recognised in the Statements of Comprehensive Income and shown in Note 2 to the Financial Statements is therefore £3,429k which represents the 2018-19 allocation plus two years' funded over-delivery.

The College is committed to observing the importance of sector measures and indicators and uses the FE Choices data available on the GOV.UK website which looks at measures such as achievement rates.

The College is required to complete the annual Finance Record for the Education & Skills Funding Agency. The Finance Record produces a financial health grading. The current rating of Good is considered an acceptable outcome.

FINANCIAL POSITION

Financial results

The College generated a deficit before other gains and losses in the year of £876k (2017-18 £456k), with total comprehensive income for the year of negative £2,506k (2017-18 positive £2,533k). The result in 2018-19 is stated after adjustment for FRS 102 (28) and enhanced pension charges of £1,726k (2017-18 £1,025k).

The College had accumulated income and expenditure reserves of negative £7,616k (2017-18 negative £5,142k) and cash and short term investment balances of £4,348k (2017-18 £5,839k) at 31st July 2019.

Tangible fixed asset additions during the year amounted to £772k (2017-18 £1,223k). This was split between buildings of £78k (2017-18 £675k) and equipment (including MIS related additions) of £694k (2017-18 £548k).

The College significantly relies on the education sector funding bodies for its principal funding source, largely from recurrent grants. In 2018-19, the funding bodies provided 78% (2017-18 78%) of the College's total income.

The College has one wholly owned subsidiary company, Logistics Skills Alliance Limited, which is a company limited by guarantee. It has been dormant since its incorporation in March 2013.

Treasury policies and objectives

Treasury management is the management of the College's cash flows, its banking, money market and capital market transactions; the effective control of the risks associated with those activities; and the pursuit of optimum performance consistent with those risks.

The College has a separate treasury management policy in place.

Short-term borrowing for temporary revenue purposes is authorised by the Accounting Officer. All other borrowing requires the authorisation of the Corporation and shall comply with the requirements of the Funding Agreement. There was no short-term borrowing required during the year.

Cash flows and liquidity

The operating cash out-flow for the year was £31k (2017-18: in-flow £2,484k).

At the year end, the College had an unsecured bank loan of £8,210k (2017-18 £8,483k) in order to help finance the new build on its main site. The loan is part of agreed long term facility with Barclays.

The size of the College's total borrowing, and its approach to interest rates, have been calculated to ensure a reasonable cushion between the total cost of servicing debt and operating cash flow.

Reserves Policy

The College has no formal reserves policy, but recognises the importance of reserves in the financial stability of an organisation, whilst ensuring that adequate resources are provided for the College's core business. The College

currently holds no restricted reserves. As at the balance sheet date, the Income and Expenditure account reserve stood at £7,771k excluding the £15,564k defined benefit pension obligation (2017-18 £8,490k and £13,632k respectively). The College's free reserves at 31st July 2019 equating to the net current assets were £1,101k (2017-18 £1,217k). It is the Corporation's intention to increase reserves by the generation of annual operating surpluses.

CURRENT AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Student numbers

In 2018-19, the College delivered activity that produced £15,188k (2017-18 £15,623k) in main funding body allocation. The College had approximately 6,350 (2017-18 6,000) students.

Student achievements

Specific areas for improvement from 2017-18 were identified through the Self-Assessment Report (SAR) process and measures were in place to achieve sustained improvement. In summary, achievement rates for most provision types and at most levels exceeded the reasonably high levels of 2017-18, preserving the consistently strong position that we have held in recent years.

Overall

The 2018-19 achievement rate for classroom-based education and training was 90%, which is 4.9 percentage points above the National Rate of 85.1%.

16-18

The 2018-19 achievement rate of 86% is five percentage points higher than in 2017-18 and 3.6 percentage points above the National Rate of 82.4%.

19+

The 2018-19 achievement rate was 92%, which is four percentage points higher than in 2017-18 and exceeds the National Rate of 88% by the same margin.

English and maths

GCSE English achievement (86%) and Maths (87%) improved on 2017-18 achievement rates by four percentage points. Overall Functional Skills achievement of 78% was higher than in 2017-18 by 9 percentage points with strong performance in Level 1 Maths.

High Grades

In 2018-19, 51% of students on Level 3 courses achieved a high grade. This met the College target and was an increase of three percentage points on 2017-18.

Curriculum developments

The curriculum offer is reviewed annually in order to ensure that it meets the needs of the local community and responds to identified skills gaps.

Following development of the new Skills + Logistics Centre in 2015-16 at our Feltham campus, which directly addressed skills gaps in the priority area of logistics, we have embedded and grown direct delivery of high-quality vocational training with clear routes to employment. We are working successfully in partnership with JCP and employers in delivering training in a range of areas such as warehouse management, forklift and reach truck driving and plant operations. We have also developed our Apprenticeship offer with more than sixty Apprentices with large employers on the new Apprenticeship Standard in International Freight Forwarding.

The College continues to deliver a range of part-time and evening courses on both sites to up-skill adults and provide them with skills and knowledge to improve employment prospects. In a year in which local unemployment rates have fallen, our Pre-Employment Training programmes have grown through the development of an ESOL pathway which provides increased opportunities for progression for these learners. PET courses have been provided to the most disadvantaged learners and those hardest to reach with achievement rates maintained at a high level.

A key focus for the College is to provide clear progression routes into employment, further training or Higher Education and many curriculum areas offer provision from Entry level through to Degree level. In addition to our own directly funded HE provision, we continued to work in partnership with some key HE providers to ensure good progression routes.

We continue to offer provision suitable for advanced learner loans and GCSE English and Maths provision for those who have not yet achieved a level 2 qualification remains a priority.

The College has well-developed 16-19 Study Programmes offering students a balanced curriculum centred on a main vocational or academic qualification with English, maths and tutorial provision as appropriate. Embedded in these programmes is a focus on enhancing the employability skills of students and in 2018-19 we continued to extend our employability projects through a centralised model to enable effective review and monitoring. Through this approach and strengthened employer relationships, 100% of full-time students aged 16-18 were able to gain experience of work through a variety of employer-led or community projects and enterprise activities, with 91% of eligible students completing a work experience placement with an external employer. Work experience with some high-profile local employers included:

- Health & Care students working with Certitude Care Homes
- Business students working with Cancer Research (Hounslow), British Heart Foundation and RSPCA Ealing
- ICT students working with Premier Inn, FARA and Healthwatch Hounslow
- Construction students working with Willmott Dixon and ENGIE UK
- Sports students working with Brentford FC, The Gym Group and ACS international Schools
- Hair & Beauty students working with Toni & Guy, IMATS and Warpaint Magazine.

In addition, the College proactively participated in the DfE industry placement pilot in 2018-19. This led to a significant extension of our employers links with 15 new employers offering multiple placements committed to the programme this year and looking to support our programme for 2019-20. Key and new employers supporting the programme included:

'Live' employer briefs and challenges augmented this extensive range of relevant work experience and included:

- Media students developing a series of short videos for the 'My London' project to present the experiences of young people growing up in London – this has had high level of exposure across social media
- Carpentry & Joinery students recommissioned to build a juice bar at South Bank for use throughout the summer by Elephant Juice
- Engineering students presenting a series of designs and modelling to improve journey experience and safety with TfL
- ICT students using authoring and content creation software to develop e-learning materials with e-learning WMB

As recommended in the positive FE Commissioner Diagnostic Report of May 2018, which endorsed the College's approach and capacity to deliver the quality improvements required, an application to the Strategic College Improvement Fund (SCIF) was submitted and received approval in October 2018. This grant funding financed a project to improve attendance on 16-19 Study Programmes in six key areas of the curriculum. The project ran to the end of the 2018-19 academic year and had a positive impact not only on attendance but on achievement too. The learning from this project was used to inform our attendance strategy for 2019-20. The work with East Kent College as our Quality Improvement Partner on the wider aspects of the project, including curriculum design and changes to roles of key staff (Student Learning Advisors, Employability Advisors and Work Placement Officers) was particularly beneficial and will be sustained and embedded in 2019-20.

Events after the end of the reporting period

There are no post balance sheet events to report.

Future prospects

We will continue to review and develop our partnerships with Ambitious about Autism (AaA) and Woodbridge Park Education Service (WPES) which strengthened over the last year through extension of bespoke provision and curriculum infill. The partnership with AaA will grow in 2019-20 through the co-location of The Rise School Sixth Form at our Isleworth campus. This will bring opportunities for The Rise School students to infill on College vocational courses whilst benefitting from a wider programme, including wrap-around support and pastoral care provided by The Rise School staff. This adds to the existing provision for some students attending Ambitious College, which has since 2016 been located at our Isleworth campus. The College and WPES, who are co-located

at our Feltham campus, will continue to collaborate on curriculum planning and development of a curriculum offer that provides progression opportunities for WPES students.

The College will continue to explore opportunities to grow partnership working in its widest sense through, for example, membership of the Heathrow Skills Partnership; participation in Hounslow Chamber of Commerce events and involvement in local community projects, such as Hounslow's development of a Creative Enterprise Zone which is a natural fit for the College with the Creative sector being a key part of our curriculum offer.

We will further develop the work of our membership organisation – the Logistics Skills Alliance (LSA) – which provides training solutions for the thriving local logistics industry. Through the LSA, we will strengthen our focus on Apprenticeships and new commercial provision and help to bridge the gap between young people and the logistics sector.

Going Concern

The financial position of the College, its cash flow, liquidity and borrowings are described in detail in the financial statements and accompanying notes.

The College had £8,210k of loans outstanding at 31 July 2019 with Barclays Bank plc on terms negotiated in 2008. Additionally, Barclays have said they will consider a request from the College for a short-term unsecured facility if needed. The terms of the existing agreement are for up to another 18 years. The College's forecasts and financial projections indicate that it will be able to operate within this existing facility and covenants for the foreseeable future and make repayments as they fall due.

The Corporation considers that the College has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future after making appropriate enquiries taking into account factors likely to affect its future development and performance.

RESOURCES

The College has various resources that it can deploy in pursuit of its strategic objectives.

Tangible resources include the main College site in London Road, which underwent a four-year major redevelopment ending in 2011, and a satellite leasehold site in Feltham which undergone capital investment of over £3m in the last few years. The Skills + Logistics Centre at our Feltham campus hosts vocational courses mainly in Logistics, Construction, Engineering and Motor Vehicles.

Financial

The College has £4,616k (2017-18 £2,110k) of net liabilities including £15,564k (2017-18 £13,632k) pension liability and long-term debt of £7,929k (2017-18 £8,210k). The College has £1,278k (2017-18 £1,217k) of net current assets.

People

The College employed approximately 281 people (expressed as full-time equivalents) during 2018-19, of whom 104 were teaching staff.

Reputation

The College has a good reputation locally and nationally. Maintaining a quality brand is essential for the College's success at attracting students and expanding external relationships.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES:

The College has undertaken further work during the year to develop and embed the system of internal control, including financial, operational and risk management which is designed to protect the College's assets and reputation.

Based on the strategic plan, the College Management Team (through the Executive Team meetings) undertakes a comprehensive review of the risks to which the College is exposed. They identify systems and procedures, including specific preventable actions which should mitigate any potential impact on the College. The internal controls are then implemented and the subsequent year's appraisal will review their effectiveness and progress against risk mitigation actions. In addition to the annual review, the College Management Team also considers any risks which may arise as a result of a new area of work being undertaken by the College.

A Board Assurance Framework is in use and a risk register is maintained at the College level which is reviewed at each meeting of the Audit Committee. The risk register identifies the key risks, the likelihood of those risks occurring, their potential impact on the College and the actions being taken to reduce and mitigate the risks. Risks are prioritised using a consistent scoring system.

Outlined below is a description of the principal risk factors that may affect the College. Not all the factors are within the College's control. Other factors besides those listed below may also adversely affect the College.

1. Government funding

The College has considerable reliance on continued Government funding through the Education & Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) and through the Office for Students (OfS). In 2018-19, approximately 90% of the College's revenue was ultimately public funded and this level of requirement is expected to continue. There can be no assurance that Government policy or practice will remain the same or that public funding will continue at the same levels or on the same terms.

The College is aware of several issues which may impact on future funding

- Increased localisation and delegation of the Adult Education Budget to the Greater London Authority
- Funding for new non-Levy Apprenticeships dependent on success in any future procurement process
- Changes to funding for 16-19 study programmes from 2020-21
- Continued cuts in real-terms to funding for classroom-based provision for adults with no government announcement on increases to funding for adult skills
- The threat of increased competition from HE institutions
- Brexit and subsequent impact on availability of European Social Funding (ESF)
- Increased Teachers' Pension Scheme employer's contribution rates

This risk is mitigated in a number of ways:

- Rigorous attention to delivering high-quality education and training.
- Maintaining and managing key relationships with the various funding bodies.
- Ensuring the College is focused on those priority sectors which will continue to benefit from public funding.
- Participating in the Hounslow 14-19 Strategic Partnership and the Hounslow Economic Business Forum.
- Continual review of the cost base and efficiency of the organisation and taking prompt in-year action to make changes when required.
- Collaboration with strategic partners including co-located organisations to improve resource utilisation and generate additional net income.
- Implementing strategies to reduce dependency on income from public funded sources.
- Robust risk management processes subject to regular review and monitoring at management and governor level.

2. Failure to maintain the financial viability of the College

The College's current financial health grade is classified as "Good" as described above. Notwithstanding that, the continuing challenge to the College in maintaining an excellent student experience and strong financial position remains the constraint on further education funding arising from the ongoing cuts in real terms to public sector spending. This risk is mitigated in a number of ways:

- By rigorous budget setting procedures and sensitivity analysis
- Regular in-year budget monitoring
- Robust financial controls
- Exploring ongoing procurement efficiencies

3. Tuition fee policy

In line with the majority of other colleges, West Thames College will increase tuition fees in accordance with the fee assumptions. The risk for the College is that demand falls off as fees are increased. This will impact on the growth strategy of the College.

This risk is mitigated by:

- Ensuring the College is rigorous in delivering high-quality education and training, thus ensuring value for money for students.
- Close monitoring of the demand for courses as prices change.

4. Failure to maintain adequate funding of pension liabilities

The financial statements report the share of the Local Government Pension Scheme deficit on the College's balance sheet in line with the requirements of FRS 102.

5. Other potentially material risks include failure to recruit and retain sufficient student volumes in order to achieve funding targets and inability to recruit or retain staff within allocated pay budgets. These risks are being actively monitored and mitigated as far as possible with contingency plans in place. In particular, attention is paid to monitoring performance against targets for enrolments and success.

The College recognises the importance of these relationships and engages in regular communication with stakeholders through the College internet site, bulletin publications and through various meetings and forums.

Equality and Diversity

West Thames College is committed to providing high-quality education and training that reflects best practice in equality and diversity. We seek to promote equality and diversity and to avoid discrimination on grounds of the protected characteristics as set out in the Equality Act 2010.

Our goal is for all of our students to be successful and we provide them with the support necessary to achieve this goal. We work to ensure our students value the diversity of others and we actively promote good relations between students.

We aim to recruit staff from diverse backgrounds, provide them with rewarding work, support their professional development and value their contributions to the College. The College will ensure that no job applicant is disadvantaged, or treated less favourably, because of conditions or requirements not related to the job. The College will consider requests for part-time working, flexible working and/or job sharing on their merit taking account of the needs and demands of the service.

The College encourages the active participation of all sections of the community and we work to provide learning opportunities that accommodate diversity and raise the aspirations and achievements of students and staff.

Disability statement

The College welcomes students with disabilities and/or learning difficulties and has made significant investment in specialised equipment, establishing an effective Inclusion team, and specialist lecturers to support students with learning difficulties and disabilities.

The College buildings have been substantially adapted with lifts, ramps and automatic doors to allow access for wheelchair users, and there are several adapted toilets and reserved car parking. Wheelchair access is available to all communal student facilities and to 98% of the classrooms.

In October 2016, the College was certified a 'Disability Confident Employer'. Prior to this, the College has since 2005 been accredited with the Positive about Disabled People "two ticks" disability symbol, demonstrating its commitment to developing all members of staff and making full use of their abilities.

The College endeavours to conduct its business:

- i. in accordance with the seven principles identified by the Committee on Standards in Public Life (selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty and leadership);
- ii. in full accordance with the guidance to colleges from the Association of Colleges in 'The Code of Good Governance for English Colleges' ('the Code'); and
- iii. having due regard to the UK Corporate Governance Code 2016 insofar as it is applicable to the further education sector.

The College is committed to exhibiting best practice in all aspects of corporate governance and in particular the College has adopted and complied with the Code. It is the Corporation's responsibility to bring independent judgement to bear on issues of strategy, performance, resources and standards of conduct.

The Corporation is provided with regular and timely information on the overall financial performance of the College, together with other information such as performance against funding targets, proposed capital expenditure, quality matters and personnel-related matters such as health and safety and environmental issues. The Corporation held six meetings during the year.

The Corporation conducts its business through five committees. Each committee has terms of reference, approved by the Corporation. The committees are the Quality & Equality Advisory Group, Search, Audit, Remuneration and Finance & Capital Projects Advisory Group. Full minutes of all meetings, except those deemed by the Corporation to be confidential, are published on the College website and are also available from the Clerk to the Corporation at:

The Clerk to the Corporation maintains a register of financial and personal interests of the members of the Corporation. The register is available for inspection at the above address.

All members of the Corporation are able to take independent professional advice, at the College's expense, in furtherance of their duties and have access to the Clerk to the Corporation, who is responsible to the Board for ensuring compliance with all applicable procedures and regulations. The appointment, evaluation and removal of the Clerk are matters for the Corporation as a whole.

Formal agenda, papers and reports are supplied to governors in a timely manner, prior to Board meetings. Briefings are also provided on an ad-hoc basis.

The Corporation has a strong and independent non-executive element and no individual or group dominates its decision making process. The Corporation considers that each of its non-executive members is independent of management and free from any business or other relationship, which could materially interfere with the exercise of their independent judgement.

There is a clear division of responsibility in that the roles of the Chair and Accounting Officer are separate.

Appointments to the Corporation

New appointments to the Corporation are a matter for the consideration of the Corporation as a whole. The Corporation has a Search Committee comprising up to five members, which is responsible for the selection and nomination of any new member for the Corporation's consideration, of any new members (with the exception of elected staff and student members). The Corporation is responsible for ensuring that appropriate training is provided as required.

Members of the Corporation are appointed for a term of office not exceeding four years. Appointments may be made for a shorter period if the Board deems it appropriate in the circumstances. Student members are appointed for one year.

Corporation performance

Governors provided strong and challenging leadership, with a relentless focus on continuous improvement. The College maintained a high overall student achievement rate, improved the quality of teaching, learning and assessment and continued to invest to significantly enhance the learning environment. The College achieved the financial health category of "Good".

The Corporation played a highly effective role in strategic planning. Briefings at each Corporation meeting and good Governor links with curriculum areas ensured Corporation Members were sufficiently well-informed to be able to steer the educational character of the College.

The Corporation continued to review strategic options in the light of reduced funding and increased competition. In a series of strategic planning sessions Corporation Members focussed on the changing educational, financial and policy context to inform an appraisal of the College's options.

The process for setting clear improvement targets which are systematically monitored is well established. In 2018-19 the majority of the improvement targets were met and/or made significant progress. The College Development Plan sets annual objectives grouped under three strategic goals. The Corporation ensures challenging targets are set for these objectives, and these are monitored at each Corporation meeting using a dashboard of key indicators. The strategic risk register cross references these strategic objectives and identifies external sources of assurance for the Board.

During 2018-19 a governance review was commissioned with outcomes reported to the Corporation. The purpose of the review was to consider whether the current approach to governance is fit for the future bearing in mind the size, complexity and diversity of the organisation and its business.

The review considered the size, composition and ways of working of the Corporation and its relationship with the executive team and sub-committees.

The review comprised of the following elements:

- Review of current performance against a number of governance good practise indicators outlined by the FE Commissioner
- Skills analysis audit conducted on current governors
- Interviews conducted by the Chair/Clerk with each Governor
- Succession planning for Governors, Chair and Clerk
- Action planning arising from the Review.

Arising from the review was a Governance Action Plan that will be subject to on-going monitoring from both the Search Committee and the Corporation.

The review included a large element of self-assessment of the Corporation's performance and performance of individual governors. No grade was awarded on the Ofsted scale, but the review concluded that governance arrangements were fit for purpose but would be further enhanced with the implementation of the action points arising from the review.

Remuneration Committee

The Remuneration Committee's Terms of Reference state that membership comprises of up to four members, excluding the Principal, staff and student governors.

The Committee's responsibilities are to make recommendations to the Board on the remuneration and benefits of the Accounting Officer and other key management personnel and to advise on the appointment of the Clerk to the Corporation.

The terms of reference for the Committee confirm that the Committee will adhere to, and follow, the requirements of the Association of College's Senior Post Holders Remuneration Code.

Details of remuneration for the year ended 31 July 2019 are set out in note 6 to the financial statements.

Audit Committee

The Audit Committee's Terms of Reference state that membership comprises of a minimum of three, and not exceeding five, members (excluding the Accounting Officer and Chair).

The Committee operates in accordance with written terms of reference approved by the Corporation. Its purpose is to advise the Corporation on the adequacy and effectiveness of the College's systems of internal control and its arrangements for risk management, control and governance processes.

The Audit Committee meets on a termly basis and provides a forum for reports from the College's internal, reporting accountants and financial statements auditors, who have access to the Committee for independent discussion, without the presence of College management. The Committee also receives and considers reports from the main FE funding bodies as they affect the College's business.

The College's internal auditors review the systems of internal control, risk management controls and governance processes in accordance with an agreed plan of input and report their findings to management and the Audit Committee.

Management is responsible for implementing agreed audit recommendations and internal audit undertakes periodic follow-up reviews to ensure such recommendations have been implemented.

The Audit Committee also advises the Corporation on the appointment of internal, reporting accountants and financial statements auditors and their remuneration for audit and non-audit work as well as reporting annually to the Corporation.

Internal Control

Scope of responsibility

The Corporation is ultimately responsible for the College's system of internal control and for reviewing its effectiveness. However, such a system is designed to manage, rather than eliminate, the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Corporation has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the Principal, as Accounting Officer, for maintaining a sound system of internal control that supports the achievement of the College's policies, aims and objectives, whilst safeguarding the public funds and assets for which she is personally responsible, in accordance with the responsibilities assigned to her in the Funding Agreement between West Thames College and the funding bodies. She is also responsible for reporting to the Corporation any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives; it can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an ongoing process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of college policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in West Thames College for the year ended 31 July 2019 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to handle risk

The Corporation has reviewed the key risks to which the College is exposed, together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The Corporation is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the College's significant risks that has been in place for the year ended 31 July 2019 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the Corporation.

The risk and control framework

The system of internal control is based on a framework of regular management information, administrative procedures including the segregation of duties, and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting systems with an annual budget, which is reviewed and agreed by the Corporation;
- regular reviews by the Corporation of periodic and annual financial reports which indicate financial performance against forecasts;
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- clearly defined capital investment control guidelines; and
- the adoption of formal project management disciplines, where appropriate.

West Thames College has an internal audit service, which operates in accordance with the requirements of the ESFA's *Post 16 Audit Code of Practice*. The work of the internal audit service is

informed by an analysis of the risks to which the College is exposed, and annual internal audit plans are based on this analysis.

The analysis of risks and the internal audit plans are endorsed by the Corporation on the recommendation of the Audit Committee. At minimum annually, the Head of Internal Audit (HIA) provides the governing body with a report on internal audit activity in the College. The report includes the HIA's independent opinion on the adequacy and effectiveness of the College's system of risk management, controls and governance processes.

Review of effectiveness

As Accounting Officer, the Principal has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. The Principal's review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by:

- the work of the internal auditor;
- the work of the executive managers within the College who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework; and
- comments made by the College's financial statements and regularity auditor in their management letters and other reports.

The Accounting Officer has been advised on the implications of the result of her review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control by the Audit Committee which oversees the work of the internal auditor and other sources of assurance, and a plan to address weaknesses and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

The senior management team receives reports setting out key performance and risk indicators and considers possible control issues brought to their attention by early warning mechanisms, which are embedded within the departments and reinforced by risk awareness training. The senior management team and the Audit Committee also receive regular reports from the internal audit and other sources of assurance, which include recommendations for improvement. The Audit Committee's role in this area is confined to a high-level review of the arrangements for internal control. The Corporation's agenda includes a regular item for consideration of risk and control and receives reports thereon from the Executive Team and the Audit Committee. The emphasis is on obtaining the relevant degree of assurance and not merely reporting by exception. At its December 2019 meeting, the Corporation carried out the annual assessment for the year ended 31 July 2019 by considering documentation from the Executive Team and the internal auditor, and taking account of events since 31 July 2019.

Based on the advice of the Audit Committee and the Accounting Officer, the Corporation is of the opinion that the College has an adequate and effective framework for governance, risk management and control, and has fulfilled its statutory responsibility for *"the effective and efficient use of resources, the solvency of the institution and the body and the safeguarding of their assets"*.

Going Concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Corporation considers that the College has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.





In line with this framework, our work has specifically not considered income received from the main funding grants generated through the Individualised Learner Record (ILR) returns, for which the Department has other assurance arrangements in place.

Respective responsibilities of Corporation of West Thames College and the Reporting Accountant

The Corporation of West Thames College is responsible, under the requirements of the Further & Higher Education Act 1992, subsequent legislation and related regulations and guidance, for ensuring that expenditure disbursed and income received is applied for the purposes intended by Parliament and the financial transactions conform to the authorities which govern them.

Our responsibilities for this engagement are established in the United Kingdom by our profession's ethical guidance and are to obtain limited assurance and report in accordance with our engagement letter and the requirements of the Code. 

1 STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND ESTIMATION TECHNIQUES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements.

Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the *Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting for Further and Higher Education 2015* (the 2015 FE HE SORP), the *College Accounts Direction for 2018 to 2019* and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 – “*The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland*” (FRS 102). The College is a public benefit entity and has therefore applied the relevant public benefit requirements of FRS 102.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the College's accounting policies.

Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention as modified by the use of previous valuations as deemed cost at transition for certain non-current assets.

Basis of consolidation

In accordance with FRS 102, the activities of the student union have not been consolidated because the College does not control those activities.

Going concern

The activities of the College, together with the factors likely to affect its future development and performance are set out in the Members' Report. The financial position of the College, its cashflow, liquidity and borrowings are presented in the Financial Statements and accompanying Notes.

The College currently has £8,210k of a loan outstanding with Barclays Bank plc on terms negotiated in 2008. The terms of the existing agreement are for up to another 18 years. This is a 25 year fixed rate loan. The College's forecasts and financial projections indicate that it will be able to operate within this existing facility and covenants for the foreseeable future and make repayments as they fall due. Additionally, Barclays have said they will consider a request from the College for a short-term unsecured facility if needed.

Accordingly, the College has a reasonable expectation that it has adequate resources for its activities to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, and for this reason will continue to adopt the going concern basis in the preparation of its Financial Statements.

Recognition of income

Revenue grant funding

Government revenue grants include funding body recurrent grants and other grants and are accounted for under the accrual model as permitted by FRS 102. Funding body recurrent grants are measured in line with best estimates for the period of what is receivable and depend on the particular income stream involved. Any under achievement for the Adult Education Budget is adjusted for and reflected in the level of recurrent grant recognised in the income and expenditure account. The final grant income is normally determined with the conclusion of the year end reconciliation process with the funding body following the year end, and the results of any funding audits. 16-18 funding is not normally subject to reconciliation and is therefore not subject to contract adjustments.

The recurrent grant from OfS represents the funding allocations attributable to the current financial year and is credited directly to the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Income from other grants, contracts and other services rendered is included to the extent the conditions of the funding have been met or the extent of the completion of the contract or service concerned.

Capital grant funding

Government capital grants are capitalised, held as deferred income within creditors allocated between creditors due within one year and creditors due after more than one year as appropriate, and recognised in income over the expected useful life of the asset under the accrual model as permitted by FRS 102.

Fee income

Income from tuition fees is stated gross of any expenditure which is not a discount and is recognised in the period for which it is received.

Investment income

All income from short-term deposits is credited to the statement of comprehensive income in the period in which it is earned on a receivable basis.

Agency arrangements

The College acts as an agent in the collection and payment of certain discretionary support and bursary funds. Related payments received from the funding bodies and subsequent disbursements to students are excluded from the income and expenditure account of the College where the College is exposed to minimal risk or enjoys minimal economic benefit related to the transaction. These are shown separately in note 25, except for the 5 per cent of the grant received which is available to the College to cover administration costs relating to the grant.

Accounting for post-employment benefits

Post-employment benefits to employees of the College are principally provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS). These are defined benefit plans, which are externally funded and contracted out of the State Second Pension.

Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS)

The TPS is an unfunded scheme. Contributions to the TPS are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the College in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by qualified actuaries on the basis of valuations using a prospective benefit method.

The TPS is a multi-employer scheme and there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting. The TPS is therefore treated as a defined contribution plan and the contributions recognised as an expense in the Statement of Comprehensive Income in the periods during which services are rendered by employees.

Hounslow Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS)

The LGPS is a funded scheme. The assets of the LGPS are measured using closing fair values. LGPS liabilities are measured using the projected unit credit method and discounted at the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred.

Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in interest and other finance costs.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in actuarial gains and losses.

Short term Employment benefits

Short term employment benefits such as salaries and compensated absences (holiday pay) are recognised as an expense in the year in which the employees render service to the College. Any

unused benefits are accrued and measured as the additional amount the College expects to pay as a result of the unused entitlement.

Enhanced pensions

The actual cost of any enhanced ongoing pension to a former member of staff is paid by the College annually. An estimate of the expected future cost of any enhancement to the ongoing pension of a former member of staff is charged in full to the College's income in the year that the member of staff retires. In subsequent years a charge is made to provisions in the balance sheet using the enhanced pension spreadsheet provided by the funding bodies.

Non-current Assets – Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Where parts of a fixed asset have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items of fixed assets.

Land and buildings

Land and buildings inherited from the Local Authority (LA) and buildings acquired since incorporation are stated in the balance sheet at valuation on the basis of depreciated replacement cost as the open market value for existing use is not readily obtainable. The associated credit is included in the revaluation reserve. The difference between depreciation charged on the historic cost of assets and the actual charge for the year calculated on the revalued amount is released to the statement of comprehensive income on an annual basis.

Land and buildings acquired and building improvements since incorporation are included in the balance sheet at cost. Freehold land is not depreciated as it is considered to have an infinite useful life. Freehold buildings are depreciated over their expected useful economic life to the College of 50 years. The College has a policy of depreciating major adaptations to buildings over the period of their useful economic life.

Where land and buildings are acquired with the aid of specific grants, they are capitalised and depreciated as above. The related grants are credited to a deferred capital grant account and are released to the Statement of Comprehensive Income over the expected useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the depreciation policy. The deferred income is allocated between creditors due within one year and those due after more than one year.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of any fixed asset may not be recoverable.

On adoption of FRS 102, the College followed the transitional provision to retain the book value of land and buildings, but not to adopt a policy of revaluations of these properties in the future.

Leasehold improvements

Improvements to leasehold properties are included on the balance sheet at depreciated cost where they increase the future benefits to the College. Depreciation on leasehold improvements is charged on a straight-line basis over length of the lease.

Subsequent expenditure on existing fixed assets

Where significant expenditure is incurred on tangible fixed assets after initial purchase it is charged to income in the period it is incurred, unless it increases the future benefits to the College, in which case it is capitalised and depreciated on the relevant basis.

Equipment

Equipment costing less than £250 per individual item is recognised as expenditure in the period of acquisition. All other equipment is capitalised at cost.

Capitalised equipment is depreciated on a straight-line basis over its remaining useful economic life as follows:

Motor vehicles	-	3 years on a straight-line basis
Computer equipment & software	-	4 years on a straight-line basis
Furniture, fittings and general equipment	-	5 years on a straight-line basis
Cabling equipment	-	10 years on a straight-line basis

Where equipment is acquired with the aid of specific grants, it is capitalised and depreciated in accordance with the above policy. The related grants are credited to a deferred capital grant account and are released to the statement of comprehensive income over the expected useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the depreciation policy. The deferred income is allocated between creditors due within one year and those due after more than one year.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income and Expenditure.

Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs are recognised as expenditure in the period in which they are incurred.

Leased assets

Costs in respect of operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the lease term to the Statement of Comprehensive Income and Expenditure.

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of their cost and net realisable value. Where necessary, provision is made for obsolete, slow moving and defective stocks.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash in hand as well as accounts and instruments that are available on demand or have a maturity of less than three months from the date of acquisition. Deposits for more than three months but less than one year have been disclosed as short term deposits.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified according to the substance of the financial instrument's contractual obligations, rather than the financial instrument's legal form.

All loans, investments and short term deposits held by the College are classified as basic financial instruments in accordance with FRS 102. These instruments are initially recorded at the transaction price less any transaction costs (historical cost). Loans and investments that are payable or receivable within one year are not discounted.

Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the end of the financial period with all resulting exchange differences being taken to income in the period in which they arise.

Taxation

The College is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the College is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by sections 478-488 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

The College is partially exempt in respect of Value Added Tax, so that it can only recover a minor element of the VAT charged on inputs. Irrecoverable VAT on inputs is included in the costs of such inputs and added to the cost of tangible fixed assets as appropriate, where the inputs themselves are tangible fixed assets by nature.

Provisions and contingent liabilities

Provisions are recognised when the College has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount expected to be required to settle the obligation is recognised at present value using a pre-tax discount rate. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as a finance cost in the Statement of Comprehensive Income in the period it arises.

A contingent liability arises from a past event that gives the College a possible obligation whose existence will only be confirmed by the occurrence or otherwise of uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the College. Contingent liabilities also arise in circumstances where a provision would otherwise be made but either it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required or the amount of the obligation cannot be measured reliably.

Contingent liabilities are not recognised in the balance sheet but are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements, management have made the following judgements:

- Determine whether leases entered into by the College either as a lessor or a lessee are operating or finance leases. These decisions depend on an assessment of whether the risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred from the lessor to the lessee on a lease by lease basis.
- Determine whether there are indicators of impairment of the College's tangible assets. Factors taken into consideration in reaching such a decision include the economic viability and expected future financial performance of the asset and where it is a component of a larger cash-generating unit, the viability and expected future performance of that unit.

Other key sources of estimation uncertainty

- *Tangible fixed assets*

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over their useful lives taking into account residual values, where appropriate. The actual lives of the assets and residual values are assessed annually and may vary depending on a number of factors. In re-assessing asset lives, factors such as technological innovation and maintenance programmes are taken into account. Residual value assessments consider issues such as future market conditions, the remaining life of the asset and projected disposal values.

- *Local Government Pension Scheme*

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 23, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. The actuary has used a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2016 to value the pensions liability at 31 July 2019. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. These regulations apply to teachers in schools, colleges and other educational establishments. Membership is automatic for teachers and lecturers at eligible institutions. Teachers and lecturers are able to opt out of the TPS.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and members contribute on a 'pay as you go' basis – these contributions, along with those made by employers, are credited to the Exchequer under arrangements governed by the above Act. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102 (28.11), the TPS is a multi-employer pension plan. The College is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the plan.

Accordingly, the College has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS 102 and has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined-contribution plan. The College has set out above the information available on the plan and the implications for the College in terms of the anticipated contribution rates.

The valuation of the TPS is carried out in line with regulations made under the Public Service Pension Act 2013. Valuations credit the teachers' pension account with a real rate of return assuming funds are invested in notional investments that produce that real rate of return.

The latest actuarial review of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education (the Department) in April 2019. The valuation reported total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218 billion, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £198 billion giving a notional past service deficit of £22 billion.

As a result of the valuation, new employer contribution rates were set at 23.68% of pensionable pay from September 2019 onwards (compared to 16.48% during 2018/19. DfE has agreed to pay a teacher pension employer contribution grant to cover the additional costs during the 2019-20 academic year.

A full copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation can be found on the Teachers' Pension Scheme website. The pension costs paid to TPS in the year amounted to £562,000 (2018: £623,000)
